These graduate expectations highlight what is both essential and distinctive about Catholic education. Together with the mission, vision, virtues, and values, they set the context and foundation for our strategic priorities and for decision-making in our Board.

Parents as Partners - Getting Involved

Establishing a positive and open relationship between parents, teachers, and students is a critical part of achieving excellence in education and it is something we value.

In addition to regularly communicating with your child's teacher, there may also be other volunteer opportunities at the school. You may even want to consider becoming involved in the Catholic School Community Council or Catholic Parent Involvement Committee.



When You Have Concerns

A strong relationship between home and school is an important part of helping all children reach their full potential. From time to time, we know there may be a misunderstanding, lack of communication, or situations that require attention. When this happens, all parties must work together to resolve the matter.

If you have an issue or concern that you would like to raise, we encourage you review the following documents:

Our process requires that issues and concerns are dealt with at the local level first, prior to it being escalated. We understand that there are some circumstances where, after all reasonable efforts are made, a response or resolution cannot be achieved with the people most directly involved. In these cases, an issue may be formally escalated.



Safe Schools

In Caring Hands

An important part of our role is to provide a learning environment where all students feel safe, valued, and respected. Our Catholic schools promote responsibility, respect, Catholic moral teaching, spirituality, civility, and academic excellence in a safe learning and teaching environment. As a Catholic school system, we must be proactive to ensure that our Catholic values are preserved and promoted.

Safe Welcome Program

All of our elementary schools have front door intercom and video technology. All visitors will need to press the buzzer to gain admittance and then proceed to the main office to sign in. We ask parents and students to be patient while waiting for office staff to buzz them into the school.

Scent-Safe Schools

All of our schools and Board office locations have implemented a Scent-Safe program. This means that we are asking that students, staff, and visitors refrain from using scented products.

We know that allergies and sensitivities to scents can have health implications, which can range from mild to severe and can even result in hospitalization. As a Catholic community, we must do everything possible to nurture a sense of belonging and inclusiveness by ensuring that those who have allergies and sensitivities are safe and fully included at school and work.

Not using scented products is a simple thing to do and it will ensure a safe and comfortable environment for all of our students and staff. We thank you for your cooperation.



Responsible Use of Technology

Our Board has a policy on the Responsible Use of Information and Communication Technology (ICT). This Board policy LE-25 is available on our website in the Policy and Procedure section at www.smcdsb.on.ca

We are excited for students and staff to embrace technology as an important part of the school's learning environment. However, it is important that everyone who accesses Board technology uses it in an appropriate and responsible way.

Our policy clearly outlines the Board's expectations related to the responsible use of ICT and its associated resources, including hardware, software, network, Internet usage, and social media. We require all individuals or groups who use Board technology to understand and comply with the expectations outlined in the policy.

At the beginning of each school year, students will be required to review age-appropriate information related to the policy, with a focus on digital citizenship, responsibilities, and consequences. Parents and students are required to read and sign a *Responsible Use of Technology Agreement* annually.

Code of Conduct

Based on guidelines from the Ministry of Education, our Board and schools have developed codes of conduct, which outline the standards of behaviour expected in our Catholic school communities. Staff, parents, students, and members of the larger community all work together to help ensure that these standards are achieved.

The spirit of Christ guides us in achieving respect, civility, and responsible citizenship through the following standards of behaviour:

- Respect and comply with all applicable federal, provincial and municipal laws;
- Demonstrate honesty and integrity;
- Respect differences in people, their ideas and opinions as each member is a unique creation of God;
- Treat one another with dignity and respect at all times, and especially when there is disagreement;
- Respect and treat others fairly, regardless of, for example, race, ancestry, place of origin, colour, ethnic origin, citizenship, creed, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, age, marital status, family status, or disability;
- Respect the rights of others;



- Dress in a manner that complies with school dress/uniform codes and is appropriate for school activities with regard to exposure, cleanliness, and/or message;
- Show proper care and regard for school property and the property of others:
- · Take appropriate measures to help those in need;
- Respect all members of the school community, especially persons in a position of authority;
- Respect the needs of others to work in an environment that is conducive
 to learning, including ensuring that cellphones and other personal
 mobile devices are only used during instructional time for education
 purposes (as directed by an educator) for health and medical purposes
 and/or to support special education needs;
- Seek assistance from a member of the school staff, if necessary, to resolve conflict peacefully;
- Not swear at a teacher or at another person in a position of authority.

In order to ensure the safety and well-being of everyone, all members of our school communities must not:

- · Cause injury to any person with an object;
- Be in possession of, or under the influence of, or provide others with, alcohol, recreational cannabis, illegal and/or restricted or illegal drugs;
- Be in possession of any weapon, including firearms;
- Use any object to threaten or intimidate another person;
- Provide alcohol, recreational cannabis, illegal and/or restricted drugs to a minor;
- Inflict or encourage others to inflict bodily harm on another person;
- Engage in bullying behaviours;
- · Commit sexual assault;
- Traffic weapons or illegal drugs;
- · Give alcohol to a minor;
- Commit robbery;
- Engage in hate propaganda and other forms of behaviour motivated by hate or bias; and
- Commit an act of vandalism that causes extensive damage to school property or to property located on the premises of the school.

Progressive Discipline

Our schools support a progressive discipline approach to addressing inappropriate behaviour in school. The aim is to combine discipline with opportunities for students to continue their education.

What is progressive discipline?

Progressive discipline is an approach that assists us in dealing with inappropriate behaviours and achieving positive outcomes at school. The approach includes interventions, supports, and consequences, which may get progressively more severe if behaviours continue to escalate. For example, discipline could range from a conversation to expulsion. However, the approach also focuses on developing strategies, preventative measures, and partnerships to proactively promote positive behaviour.

Building Communities of Respect

We know that bullying is an issue that is often discussed at school, at home, and in the community. Everyone has the right to feel safe in school and that is why we are committed to building communities of respect in each and every one of our schools. We know that bullying can manifest itself in many different ways including cyber-bullying, name-calling, fighting, and gossiping.

It is important to let students know that if they are experiencing any kind of bullying, that they must speak to a trusted adult so that the issue can be addressed. As always, our caring and professional staff is committed to working with parents to make sure that every child feels welcome and respected both inside and outside of the classroom.

Restorative Practices

One of the approaches that our Board uses to promote positive behaviour and to address issues of concern is called "Restorative Practice." This approach is based on the premise that young people can take responsibility and learn from their choices. Students are invited to participate in dialogue and are encouraged to take ownership of their behaviour. Questions such as What happened? What were you thinking at the time? and What have you been thinking since? replace accusation, blame, and recrimination.

Our principals, school counselors, and teachers are widely using this approach to help resolve conflicts and provide an opportunity to repair harm. We have had great success with Restorative Practice at our Board. It is helping us build caring communities and enhance learning opportunities for students, as well as reducing and preventing bullying and truancy.



Including Every Student

Equity and Inclusion

As a publicly-funded Catholic school board, we understand equity and inclusion to be essential characteristics of life in our school board, schools and board sites. We are committed to ensuring that students, staff and families feel welcome, safe, included and represented in our board and its educational work.

Our work in equitable and inclusive education is grounded both in relevant legislation and human rights documents, and in the social teachings of the Catholic Church, which emphasize the inherent dignity of every person, regardless of their race, age, language, colour, national or cultural background, ability, socio-economic status, gender identity or sexual orientation. In 1991, Pope St. John Paul II wrote that "Human persons are willed by God; they are imprinted with God's image" (Centesimus Annus, #11), and Vatican documents remind us of "the radical equality and brotherhood among all people, regardless of their race, nation, sex, origin, culture, or class" (Compendium of the Church's Social Teaching, #144). Our goal is to continually build up communities where people can flourish, and in which their God-given identity and gifts can fully shine forth.

Special Education Program

We believe that God has created each child as a unique individual. We promote an atmosphere that includes and accepts everyone at our schools.

The Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) of the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board places a significant emphasis on special education programming and our Board makes a commitment to include all students in classroom learning experiences.

We support and encourage children with special needs so that they can participate at school in meaningful ways. There may be specific programs, services, and resources to help support your child. For students with exceptional learning needs, school staff will work with parents to develop an Individual Education Plan. Making the Grade

Assessment and Evaluation

As a Catholic school Board, we recognize each student as an individual who, through God, possesses unique gifts and experiences. In addition, we always strive to maintain children's self-worth and dignity and provide opportunities for hope and success.

In our schools, assessment and evaluation are about more than measuring achievement and assigning value to your child's work. Our objective is to improve how students learn. We use information from assessments to improve teaching strategies and programs for your child.

Student Transportation

Riding the bus is an important part of your child's school experience. We want all our students to feel as safe and comfortable as possible. This requires the support of parents, students, and all members of our community who use the roads when school buses are in operation.

Criteria for Bus Cancellations

School bus operators, in consultation with the Simcoe County Student Transportation Consortium, are responsible for determining if buses will be canceled. For our Muskoka schools, decisions around bus cancellations will be coordinated by the Trillium Lakelands Transportation Consortium.

Early in the morning, the bus operators assess the weather and road conditions to determine if the buses will start and run safely on our roads. Student safety is always the number one priority in making decisions regarding cancellations. Know Your Weather Zone (Simcoe County only)

Weather zones are used to allow for partial bus cancellations on inclement weather days. There are four zones in Simcoe County – north, south, central, and west – and it is important for you to know which zone your school resides in (our Muskoka and Parry Sound schools do not use this system). Check on your school's website or in the school section of this agenda to find out your weather zone.

Here is an example of how weather zones work – it may be that the weather in the Collingwood area is such that it is not safe for the buses to travel the roads, and so buses in the west weather zone would be canceled, while the buses in the remaining three zones would continue to run. No school belongs in more than one zone.



With a balanced day schedule, students will have two nutrition breaks, each 40 minutes in length. The first will begin at 10:40 a.m. and the second will begin at 12:40 p.m. Half of the school will eat for 20 minutes while the other half is outside for recess. After 20 minutes, there will be a switch so that every student has both an opportunity to eat and to go outside for recess. This balanced day schedule allows for larger uninterrupted learning blocks and cuts down on the number of transitions typical of a traditional day schedule.

FAITH IN OUR SCHOOL COMMUNITY

Our Parish Partner

We believe in fostering a strong relationship between home, school and Holy Martyrs of Japan Church. Our parish works closely with our school community to provide our children with an education rooted in the Catholic faith.

Throughout the year, there will be opportunities for our students to participate in the sacraments, Mass and prayer celebrations. Recently, we said farewell to Fr. Joshua Roldan and wish him luck in his new position with the Archdiocese of Toronto. We welcome Pastor Fr. John Pak and Associate Pastor Fr. Massillamani Zacharias. We look forward to having our church leaders visit the school often and to engage with them as we celebrate special events with our community.

Sacramental Preparation

We work closely with our parish community to support our students as they get ready to receive their sacraments.

Each year, students in Grade 2 have the opportunity to receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Communion. Parents will work with Holy Martyrs of Japan Church to prepare for these sacraments. Our school supports and complements what children are learning at the parish through classroom learning.

In Grade 7, students will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. Again, arrangements for this sacrament are made through the parish, but the preparation and celebration of the sacrament is an important part of the students' year.

POSITIVE SCHOOL CLIMATE

Promoting a Positive School Climate

Maintaining a positive school climate at St. Angela Merici Catholic School is a key priority because it helps students feel safe, welcome, and secure. Using Catholic values as a guide, we have procedures and guidelines to ensure that our students and staff learn and work in a positive and productive environment.

Student Behaviour

Our school has established some key statements to outline expectations around student behaviour.

Students at St. Angela Merici Catholic School:

- will be active, positive, and enthusiastic participants within our Catholic community as we strive to live out the Gospel message;
- will come to school on time and prepared to work with an enthusiastic and positive attitude, while striving to achieve their academic goals;
- will be familiar with and practise the school procedures as outlined in this school handbook, in addition to any policies outlined by administration during the school year;
- will respect and obey those in authority within our school community including, but not limited to, teachers, early childhood educators, educational assistants, custodians, office administrative staff, noon

- hour supervisors, and volunteers. Students will address staff and visitors to our school community in a polite and courteous manner; and,
- will respect fellow students as they listen actively, speak honestly, and respond positively in the classroom, in the schoolyard, on the bus, and as ambassadors of our school in the community.

Dress For Success

Students will be participating in a wide range of activities at school – both inside and outdoors – and so, it is important that they wear comfortable and durable clothing that is suitable for the weather.

We model ourselves after Jesus Christ. How we present ourselves must reflect our commitment to promoting a safe, positive, and respectful learning environment.

Dress Code

We are working to make sure that our dress code supports equity and inclusion. We are doing this by following the Ontario Human Rights Code and by respecting difference and diversity. We invite families to review our <u>current dress code guidelines</u>. In the fall, we will be connecting with school communities to invite input.

Footwear

For safety reasons and to maintain cleanliness in the classrooms, students must have indoor shoes to wear inside their class. Outdoor footwear is not to be worn in indoor teaching/learning areas.

SAFE SCHOOLS

Safe Arrival and Attendance

Children are expected to arrive at school on time. It is important that your child learns the value of being punctual. Our Safe Arrival Program, which includes communicating with our office when your child is late or absent, helps ensure student safety. Any children entering the school after the morning or afternoon entry bell, must first report to the office to obtain an "Admit" slip.

When a student is absent and a call has not been placed to the school, you will receive an automated call. At this point, you will have an opportunity to provide a reason for your child's absence.

Compulsory School Attendance

Did you know that Ontario law states that children between the ages of 6 and 17 must attend school? We appreciate that sometimes there are circumstances beyond your control, such as illness, that might prevent attendance at school. However, these situations should be rare and students should be at school during all other times. The school principal will address prolonged absences.

If your child is away for more than 15 days consecutively due to illness, a medical note will be needed to maintain your child on the school register. There are many supports in place to encourage regular school attendance, including school counsellors and community agencies. Please contact the school if you have questions or concerns.

Reporting Your Child Late or Absent

Please follow this simple, but critical process when reporting your child as late or absent.

Step 1 – phone our school at 289-231-2085 or use the absence reporting tool in our parent portal **Home2School Connect** at smcdsb.on.ca/our schools/parent connect any time, to inform us when your child will be absent or late. These options are available 24 hours per day.

Step 2 – leave your child's full name, teacher's name and the reason for the absence.

Step 3 – if your child is late, please have them go to the office where they will check in and be provided a late slip for admittance to class.

Safe Welcome Program

All of our elementary schools have front door intercom and video technology installed as part of the Ministry of Education's Safe Welcome Program.

The intention of the program is for all elementary

schools in Ontario to have doors locked throughout the school day. This means that students who are late for school or return to school after an appointment will need to be buzzed in through the main entrance. This enhanced security measure provides us with one more way to monitor visitors to our school and helps us ensure that all visitors sign in at the office.

Picking Children Up During the Day

Please come to the office when picking up your child at any time during the school day. The Office Administrator will then arrange to have your child meet you in the office area. For security reasons, parents/visitors may <u>not</u> visit classrooms/portables or enter the schoolyard to pick up children. If you plan to pick up your child early in the day, before dismissal, please send a note to your child's teacher.

Please note that children will only be called to the office once a parent arrives at the school since Office Administrators are neither responsible for nor permitted to supervise. In addition, parents are sometimes delayed getting to school at a predetermined time and valuable learning time is lost when students have to wait lengthy periods.

Pick-up or drop-off of your child is not an appropriate time to meet with the teacher. Parents are asked to please make an appointment if they wish to speak to the teacher so that there will be no distractions as daily routines get underway. This is extremely important.

Yard Supervision

Yard supervision begins at 8:25 a.m. A bell will signal the start of supervision. Students should not arrive at the school before 8:25 a.m.

Students will remain outside until the 8:40 a.m. bell, unless there is inclement weather. When there is significant precipitation or when the temperature is extremely cold, students will be directed indoors.

All students are to enter and exit the building through their designated doors (the same doors they use for recess). Students should only use the main front doors when they are being signed in due to late arrival or signed out by a parent or guardian prior to the end of the school day.

Active Transportation

Our school, together with the Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury and Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit, is actively promoting walking to and from school. Walking is a great form of daily exercise. Our students arrive invigorated and better prepared for learning. Please encourage your child(ren), when appropriate, to walk or "wheel" to school on a regular basis. "Wheeling" can include riding a bike, scooter, skateboard, roller blading, etc. Students must follow safety rules and laws, including wearing a properly fitting helmet.

Students must walk their bikes, scooters, or skateboards when on school property. Roller blades must be removed once on school property. Please note that the school cannot accept responsibility for damaged or stolen bicycles, scooters, or skateboards.

Know Your Weather Zone

Weather zones are used to allow for partial bus cancellations across the county. There are four weather zones and it is possible that buses will run in our zone, but be cancelled in another zone and so it is important for you to know your zone. St. Angela Merici Catholic School is in the **SOUTH weather zone**.

On inclement weather days, we urge you to visit <u>simcoecountyschoolbus.ca</u> or listen to a local radio station to find out if buses are cancelled. On days when buses are not running, students in attendance will continue to receive the same level of supervision as on any other school day. Regular classroom programs, however, may be suspended if a large number of students or staff are absent. These days provide a good opportunity for students to get caught up on work, receive one-on-one support, or small-group instruction.

Custody

We rely on and appreciate your cooperation in helping us ensure the safety of the students entrusted to our care. In some family situations, there may be custody issues, visiting rights, and special instructions – it is critical that we be made aware of any such situation. Please ensure that the office staff and the classroom teacher are aware of legal agreements between separated or divorced parents and copies of current legal documents are on file in the office.

Emergency Situations

At St. Angela Merici Catholic School, procedures are in place so that we are fully prepared for an emergency situation. Staff and students routinely practise these procedures. If it is necessary to evacuate the school, our students will be relocated to Holy Trinity Catholic High School or Chris Hadfield P.S. In the case of an emergency, relocating students to this location is the responsibility of the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board. In any emergency situation, our school would work closely with the school board and emergency personnel to provide updates via websites and the media (schoolmessenger, Twitter, etc.).

In very rare circumstances, for example a power outage or loss of heat in the winter, we may be required to close the school early. In emergency situations or early school closures, your child may be picked up by you or an authorized designate.

Major Incidents

We know that being proactive and preparing for the potential of a major incident is a key way to keep our students and staff safe. As part of our Safe Schools initiative, St. Angela Merici Catholic School has worked with the local police service to develop a response plan should a violent incident occur.

This involves immediate contact with the police and a lockdown of the premises. Although highly unlikely that something like this would occur, our staff regularly reviews and practises procedures with the students. Your child may mention to you that they were involved in a "Lock Down" drill because that is what our response plan is referred to within the school. Similarly, staff and students are required to participate in six fire drills (three in the

fall and three in the spring), bomb threat drill, and severe weather drill. Efforts are taken to educate and prepare our students ahead of these events.

GETTING INVOLVED

Communicating With You

Establishing a positive and open relationship between parents, teachers and students is a critical part of achieving excellence in education.

The Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board uses the SchoolMessenger Communicate Tool to send messages and updates to our staff and families. These messages can be sent via email, text message or phone. Our school will use this tool to send regular updates to families throughout the year and it will also be used by the Board or the school to communicate information during crisis or emergency situations. It is important that the school office has your most current email address and phone number on file so that you receive the messages in a timely manner.

We welcome opportunities for parents to meet with teachers and other school staff as necessary throughout the school year.

Online Payment Using School-Day

A letter has been sent home to families who are new to the school with details about our online payment tool. This letter contains a 10-digit "Secure Match Key". You must use this key to register and set up an account linked to our school for the online payment tool. Families who have had access from previous years (at any SMCDSB school) should have still access using the email and password previously used. If you have forgotten your password, select, "forgot password" and you will be provided directions to reset your password.

Once you register, you will be able to:

- Approve permission forms and pay online instantly;
- Register your child for extracurricular activities;
- Order and pay for hot lunches; and,
- Reduce the amount of paper sent home in backpacks.

Visit www.school-day.com to register. Once you have registered, you can pay for items and approve permission forms by clicking on the "Online Payment" quick link on our school website or logging in directly on the school-day website: www.school-day.com.

School Boundary

Due to the large number of students at St. Angela Merici, we are designated as a "closed boundary" school. This means that only families residing within our school boundary can send their children to our school. Unfortunately, we cannot accept out-of-boundary exemption requests. Parents will be asked to confirm their residence by providing a recent utility bill or other Ministry-approved document. We thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

Contact Information

Please inform the school office if your address or any other pertinent information such as home or work telephone numbers, or email addresses, change throughout the year. We need to ensure that our records are accurate and up-to-date.

Making the Most of the School Day

In order to promote the best learning environment possible, we ask that parents keep school day interruptions to a minimum. Planning in advance and maintaining regular communication with the school and/or teacher will help maintain a harmonious and smooth day at school.

- Dropping off items parents are not permitted to go to their child's classroom to drop off items, check-in, etc. If you need to see your child for some reason or would like to drop something off during the school day, you must check-in at the office.
- Speaking with the teacher if you have questions, we encourage you to speak to your child's teacher, but we recommend that you arrange discussion for either before or after school hours. In addition, if you are making a change to your child's regular routine, please make these arrangements well in advance and communicate changes

in writing with your child's teacher and the office

- Last-minute messages our office is very busy during the day and so we urge you not to rely on us to get last-minute messages to your child, unless it is an emergency.
- Using the telephone students will not be permitted to use the office telephone unless they have permission from their teacher or office staff. If a phone call is necessary, it will be made by the teacher or another adult (this includes calls regarding illness or injury).
- Use of cell phones cell phones are permitted ONLY when supervised by their classroom teacher and ONLY when used as an educational tool. Cell phone use out of these parameters will result in the cell phone being confiscated and held in the office until a parent can pick it up. Emergency calls need to go through the office. Students must keep their cell phones in their backpacks, unless instructed otherwise by their teachers for educational purposes. At the end of the school day, students must wait until they are off school property to use their phones.

Catholic School Community Council

Our Catholic School Community Council is composed of parents, a teaching staff representative, a support staff representative, a parish representative, a representative from the community and the principal. Members are elected each fall and serve as an advisory body to the principal on many significant school issues throughout the year. Council represents the school community and works effectively with the school to communicate and respond to the needs of the community.

- Anyone is welcome to attend the meetings. Dates are regularly sent out in our weekly communication, Weekly Parent Newsletter.
- Council believes that school goals should be supported and assisted by parents of our school population. To support these goals that benefit the students directly, Council relies on parents to support

fundraising initiatives.

All parents are encouraged to get involved.

HEALTHY SCHOOLS

We know that parents want us to promote a healthy environment at school. This includes promoting healthy food options, opportunities for physical activity, and minimizing exposure to illness, all of which contribute to better learning.

Scent-Safe Schools

Please be advised that a Scent-Safe Schools program is now in place for all schools and board office locations. This means that we are asking for the cooperation of students, staff, and visitors in not using scented products in our working and learning environments.

We know that allergies and sensitivities to scents can have severe health implications, and so we must do everything possible to ensure that all students, staff, and visitors with scent allergies and sensitivities are safe and fully included.

A scent is a smell or odour from products, and it can be natural, such as flowers, or synthetic, such as perfume. Examples of products that may have scents include shampoos, deodorant, hairspray, soap, detergents, perfumes, lotions, candles, and cleaning products.

Not using scented products is a simple thing to do, and it will help ensure a safe and comfortable environment for all of our students and staff.

Accident or Illness

If your child becomes sick or gets injured while at school, we will contact you as soon as possible. If you are not available, or unable to be contacted, we will call the emergency contacts that you have listed in your child's record. It is essential that parents and guardians notify the school of changes to phone numbers or contacts. If your child is well enough to attend school, he/she will be required to go outside for recess. We do not have staff supervision to keep students in for this reason.

Concussion Protocol

Rowan's Law mandates that all schools implement and follow a concussion protocol when a student suffers a blow to the head or other event and a concussion is suspected. A parent or guardian will be contacted following the incident. A concussion package will be provided for follow-up with a medical practitioner. A return-to-school plan will be developed after a concussion is confirmed.

Communicable Diseases

The *Health Promotion and Protection Act* requires that children with certain communicable diseases must remain at home.

The following list defines some of the more common childhood diseases and how long your child should stay home if he/she becomes ill with one of these illnesses:

- **Chickenpox** for 5 days after the rash begins or until all blisters have crusted.
- **Impetigo** until the antibiotic prescribed by the doctor has been taken for at least one full day (24 hours).
- **Pink-eye** until the antibiotic prescribed by the doctor has been taken for at least one full day (24 hours).
- **Scabies** until treatment has been given.
- **Scarlet Fever** until the antibiotic prescribed by the doctor has been taken for at least one full day (24 hours).
- **Strep Throat** until the antibiotic prescribed by the doctor has been taken for at least one full day (24 hours).
- **Fifth Disease** even though this is not a communicable disease, it should be reported to the office because there is a risk posed to pregnant women.

Head Lice

Any situation related to head lice will be dealt with in a discreet manner, thereby protecting the dignity of the child and the privacy of the family. Our school will educate students about preventative measures, and we will also send current information from the Simcoe Muskoka

District Health Unit home to parents.

We are asking parents and guardians to help us prevent incidents or the spread of head lice by doing the following:

- Examine your child's head for ossible infestations at regular intervals.
- Notify the school of any infestations.
- Ensure that proper and full de-infestation takes place within a reasonable length of time.

The major signs and symptoms of head lice are: intense itching, frequent and persistent head scratching with scratch marks, or an apparent rash on the neck and scalp. Further information regarding head lice is available through the school office or by visiting the Health Unit's website at simcoemuskokahealth.org.

Immunizations

In Ontario, under the *Immunization of School Pupils Act*, you must provide proof that your child's vaccinations are current. When you register your child for school for the first time, you will be asked for a record of your child's immunization. Students, who do not have up-to-date immunization or a valid exemption on file at the Health Unit, may be suspended from school. You can find out more about immunization programs on the Health Unit's website at simcoemuskokahealth.org.

Administering Medication

Some students may require regular or special medication. Our board has a medication administration policy, which states that no medication can be administered by staff without written permission from parents. Students may not carry medication with them at any time, with the exception of an EpiPen (for anaphylaxis) and/or inhaler. Informed consent must be provided from parents should a child be required to carry it with them. If a child requires medication, we will gladly administer it, but only by assigned staff in the office.

For medication to be administered, a consent and instruction form must be filled out. These

forms and our board's policy are available at our office or on the board's website at smcdsb.on.ca.

HEALTHY EATING

Nutrition Breaks

With a balanced-day schedule, our students will have two 40-minute nutritional breaks each day. Our students will be divided into two groups so that half will eat first while the other half has recess. Then, after 20 minutes, they switch.

Nutritional Break #1

10:40 a.m. Group 1 eats/ Group 2 recess 11:00 a.m. Group 2 eats/ Group 1 recess

Nutrition Break #2

12:40 p.m. Group 1 eats/ Group 2 recess 1:00 p.m. Group 2 eats/ Group 1 recess

*Please note that hot food lunch orders will be ordered for Nutritional Break #2. Any changes to this arrangement will be communicated to parents well in advance.

By maintaining split nutritional blocks, we can better manage our numbers outside during recess. With roughly half the student population out at one time, students will have more space in which to play and enjoy recess.

Students will eat their lunches at their desks and will remain on school property, unless special permission has been granted. Students who walk to school may go home for lunch if they have written permission from a parent. For the safety of your child, we ask that a consistent routine be established. If your child is going to a friend's house for lunch, written permission is required from the parents of both children.

Snacks

Students will be provided with time in the classroom to have snacks and drinks. All food and beverages must be consumed in the classroom and are not to be consumed in the hallway, gym, washrooms, or outside at recess. We discourage students from using glass bottles and containers for their drinks and snacks.

Allergies

Many children have allergies, but for some students an allergy can be life-threatening. For example, even a minimal exposure to peanuts can prove fatal within minutes. Some other common allergens include tree nuts, shellfish, eggs, milk and latex – all of these can cause severe reactions.

If your child has a severe allergy, it is absolutely critical that you let us know. With your help, we will do our best to reduce risk and make sure all our students are safe, healthy, and able to concentrate on learning.

Staff is instructed on how to deal with anaphylactic shock. However, our best course of action is to prevent exposure to potentially lifethreatening allergies. As a school community, we must work together to ensure the safety of all students.

Here is what we are doing to reduce the risk of allergic exposure:

- All food and beverages must be consumed inside the classroom – under no circumstances are students allowed to have snacks in the schoolyard.
- Our school is a peanut and tree nut <u>aware</u> <u>zone</u>. Please ensure that all food sent to school with your child meets the nut-aware standard. This includes "Wow Butter" and hazelnut spread (Nutella, etc.) products. Board policy does not permit "Wow Butter" on school premises.
- Your child's teacher will inform you if there are other allergies in your child's classroom.
 We ask that you please understand and appreciate the health and safety of every student by not sending food and beverage items that may be a cause for concern.
- We ask that you not provide treats for the classroom for special occasions. There are many students with a variety of food allergies and so we err on the side of caution to make sure all of our students are safe. Please consider non-food options as treats.

Selling Food and Beverage

We know that making healthy food choices while in school supports learning. The Government of Ontario has a school food and beverage policy, which has impacted the kinds of food and beverages we can sell at our school. The policy encourages selling lunches, snacks and drinks that follow the principles of healthy eating in *Canada's Food Guide*.

Please note that St. Angela Merici Catholic School is fully compliant with the school food and beverage policy as mandated by the Ministry of Education. We will be offering healthy food options to our students. Additional information will be provided in the fall.

BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Recess

Getting some fresh air and participating in physical activity at recess is important. Unless the weather is unsuitable, students are expected to be outside during recess. We cannot leave children unsupervised inside the classroom, and so they must go out to the yard where supervision is provided.

Dressing for the Weather

We ask that students dress in clothing that is suitable for the weather – this is especially important during the winter months. Durable and warm clothing will help ensure that your child's outdoor experiences are enjoyable. It is also advisable to label all clothing, i.e., mitts, hats and indoor shoes, with your child's first and last name.

Yard Safety

While outside at recess, we expect students to play safely and respect the rules of the schoolyard at all times. During the winter months, it is essential to leave all snow on the ground.

Throwing snowballs or kicking snow is not acceptable and poses a safety risk to others.

Bringing Personal Property to School

Please remember that the school is not responsible for damage, theft or loss to personal property. Valuables must not be brought to school. Mobile devices are not to be used on school property, unless approved by the classroom teacher, using the BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) policy — typically for Grade 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 students. Inappropriate and unsupervised use of cell phones will result in the phone being confiscated and held in the office until a parent can pick it up.

Lost and Found

We encourage our students to regularly check the lost and found for any misplaced items. If you know your child is missing something, you are welcome to check the lost and found yourself (please check in at the office first). Unclaimed items will eventually be donated to a local charity.

Field Trips

Students enjoy going on trips outside of the school. Field trips are a fun and informative way of providing your child with a new learning experience. Our board has a field trip policy, which you can find in the Policy and Procedures section of the website at smcdsb.on.ca.

The classroom teacher will inform parent volunteers of responsibilities and expectations as well as appropriate strategies for dealing with misbehaviour. Prior to the field trip, the teacher will discuss the purpose of the field trip and learning outcomes for students.

Volunteers

We would like to thank all of our volunteers for the wonderful things they do to enhance our students' experiences at school. From volunteering in the classroom to assisting on school trips, your assistance is much appreciated.

As a parent, if you wish to help out in any way at St. Angela Merici Catholic School, please be aware that a current Criminal Background Check (CBC) with a Vulnerable Sector Screening (VSS) is required to be on file with the office. This applies to all school-related activities including driving students, assisting around the school with hot lunch, or accompanying students on class

trips. The form can be picked up from the school. Once signed by the principal, you will need to take it to the South Simcoe Police Service at 81 Melbourne Drive, Bradford.

A CBC is valid for one year. Each year thereafter, you may complete an Annual Offence Declaration (AOD) Form at no additional cost. To be able to continue to volunteer in our school, please pick up this form from the office and return it as soon as possible. Lapsed CBCs and AODs will require a new check to be completed.

Co-curricular Activities

There are various clubs and sports teams offered at the school. Many take place during nutritional breaks, as well as before or after school. These cocurricular activities provide opportunities for students to learn new skills and form friendships. They help to teach teamwork, co-operation, and demonstrate school spirit.

In order to participate in co-curricular activities, students must make a sincere effort in their academic endeavours, and demonstrate acceptable levels of trust-worthiness. Students must conduct themselves in an appropriate manner both in and out of the school. It is important for students to represent our school community by showing good sportsmanlike qualities and by dressing appropriately for all events.

SUPPORTING YOUR CHILD'S LEARNING

Homework

Homework is an integral part of a student's learning experience. In order to get the most out of school, students will be required, at times, to finish or continue their studies outside of the classroom. Research clearly shows that students who successfully complete homework achieve greater academic success in school.

On occasion, parents become concerned with the amount or content of homework assigned by the classroom teacher. If this is the case, please contact your child's teacher.

It is recommended that all students read each night, and, in the case of younger students, be read to by a parent or older sibling. For families whose first language is not English, we have some wonderful dual-language books available through the library (English-Portuguese, English-Polish, English-Italian, etc.). It is recommended that parents read to their children in their native language.

Students can also practice important math skills daily. The best, and most fun way of doing so, is by playing card, dice, and board games as a family. For example, Dominoes is a great way to develop the skill of "subitizing" — this is the ability to recognize a grouping of dots without having to count each dot individually. Using dice also facilitates the acquisition of this skill.

Notebooks

Our school provides students with notebooks for subject areas or projects to support them in their learning. The notebooks provided to our students for school use are to be kept neat and organized. Only items pertaining to your child's learning should be written in the books. Defacing or marking of notebooks is not acceptable.

Library Resources

Students will have the opportunity to sign out books or resources from the school library. These items must be returned the next time they visit the library. Students will not be able to sign out new material until their previous items have been returned. If a book is lost or damaged, it is expected that the student or parent will replace the item or cover the cost of replacement.

Internet Use Agreement Form

Your child must sign an Internet Use Agreement form. Once this form is signed, he/she will be able to access the internet. All time spent on the internet will be closely supervised. Students who repeatedly misuse this privilege will lose it. Depending on the severity of the incident, other consequences, including suspension, are possible.
